

AZTEC FUJI (50 avail)

The Aztec Fuji Apple is considered the best Fuji on the market. Beautiful highlights and deep red color give the Aztec its own unique look, and is definitely a dessert apple. Thin-skinned, with a firm, crisp texture, the apples are large in size and deliver a sweet flavor and low acidity. Perfect for baking apple pie! Harvest October-November.

GALE GALA (50 avail)

Gale Gala was discovered by Wally Gale in his Malaga, Washington Royal Gala orchard. This sport develops 90-100 percent full red color with deep red striping, allowing harvest in one or two pickings. The finish is very clean. Fruit size, firmness and eating quality are equal to other Gala sports. Harvest early-mid September.





HONEYCRISP, Royal Red (100 avail)

This newer apple is crisp, sweet and juicy like its popular parent but is brighter red in color and has improved storage characteristics. This is a sport of Honeycrisp, featuring the same great flavor as its parent. The rich vibrant red color of its skin makes it distinct and attractive, and is touted for its ability to be stored longer than the original. Harvest mid-September.



hese trees are semi-dwarf and will come as bareroot stock. Dig hole wide enough to accommodate the roots when spread out. Plant with bud union 3 inches above the soil line to prevent the graft from rooting. Fill the hole, and pat it down to eliminate air pockets. Water thoroughly. All apple varieties require other varieties of apples to pollinate and produce fruit.

Tree Planter



Cranberry, Highbush

Shrub, medium growth rate, will reach a height of 8-12' with an equal round spread. Prefers good, well-drained soil, full sun to partial shade. Edible fruit, excellent for preserves.



Dogwood, Grav

This tough, low-maintenance shrub offers subtle year-round beauty. White panicles of flowers brighten the landscape in June. White berries and pinkish fruit attract birds the late summer into winter.



Elderberry, American

Fast growing shrub with whitish flowers in late spring early summer. Bears a purple-black fruit in August. Makes excellent wine and jam, and often used in many naturopathic remedies.



Hazelnut, American

A large fast growing shrub with showy spring flowers. Best used when naturalizing an area.



Ninehark

Upright dense spreading shrub. Bears white or pinkish flowers in spring and red colored seeds in fall. Blooms May to early June.



Serviceberry

Slow growing, moderately long lived, reaches a height of 12-24'. Wide range site tolerances. Will not do well on wet soils. Bears sweet and juicy black fruit and is characterized by bronzy colored leaves that turn orange-red in fall.

It has a 3-point hitch and is pulled by a tractor. A 40 hp tractor will pull the planter through very soft soil. If your planting site doesn't meet this condition, a larger tractor (80-100 hp) will be needed. A large tub holds the trees in front of a comfortable vellow seat. The large disc in front slices



the ground, followed by a plow shoe which opens the soil for tree placement. By hand, you place the tree in position and a cement packer wheel follows close behind to close and firm the soil. A handy clicker signals when the spacing is appropriate for the next tree. Transporting the tree planter is easy. Hauled on a 4' x 8' trailer, it can be easily lifted on and off with your tractor.

Colorado Blue Spruce

Rich blue-green needles. Grows on most soil types but does not like real wet soil. Moderately shade tolerant, drought resistant



Norway Spruce

Deep green needles, araceful droopina branches with large cones. Fastest growing spruce. Grows well on most sites



Red Pine

Plant in well-drained sandy soil, full sun. Medium to fast arowina. Height 50-80'. Sheds lower branches as it matures. SEEDLING ONLY



White Pine

Does best on rich, porous moist soils and well-drained sandy soil. Shade tolerant & fast growing. Height 80-100'.



TAMARACK

A deciduous conifer that likes its "feet wet" with delicate needles that



fast growing, best suited for wet sites. TRANSPLANT ONLY

SEEDLINGS VS TRANSPLANTS

A **seedling** is a plant that has been grown from seed and harvested bareroot for sale.

A transplant has been moved into a more controlled environment where they continue to grow for another year or two before being harvested with a larger root mass. A little more expensive but a jumpstart on growing!


